Perhaps the family is confused and is mixing between "ward Maryam" and "kaff Maryam" (lit. the hand of Maryam)." The former is what is mentioned in the question, which is a myth, as noted above. The plant called "kaff Maryam" is the one that has to do with childbirth, as it is proven that it helps a woman in childbirth.

The plant called "kaff Maryam" is known scientifically by the name *Anastatica hierochuntica*. It is used to treat colds in children, by steaming, and an infusion of this plant is drunk to make childbirth easy, if it is difficult.

Dr. Jabir ibn Salim al-Qahtani – who is a specialist in herbal medicine – said:

"Kaff Maryam" is a plant which resembles a clenched fist, and is used when a woman feels that labour has started; it is ground and soaked in a cup of cold water for four hours, then it is strained and the water is drunk only once." (*Jaridat ar-Riyadh* (newspaper), 28 Rabi' al-Awwal 1428 AH/ 16 April 2007 CE, issue no. 14175)

It is believed that the name of the plant comes from a fable which claims that Maryam (peace be upon her) grasped it in her clenched hand whilst giving birth.
